NORTHBOUND: THE NORTH SEA AND THE ARCTIC OCEAN, THREATS AND SOLUTIONS

Wednesday 11 May from 2.30pm to 6pm at the Oceanographic Museum

This seminar takes place in the context of the exhibition "Northbound. Connected by the Sea" by the Museum Kunst der Westküste (MKdW) at the Oceanographic Museum of Monaco, with the support of Prof. Dr. mult. h.c. Frederik Paulsen, founder of the MKdW. The two institutions are devoting a seminar to the North Sea and the Arctic Ocean, in the presence of HSH Prince Albert II of Monaco, on 11 May 2022 from 2.30 pm to 6 pm.

The North Sea is a marginal sea (or epicontinental sea) covering almost 575,000 km2 and linking many countries, including the United Kingdom, Sweden, Norway, Denmark, Germany, the Netherlands, Belgium and France. Together with its close neighbour, the Arctic Ocean, to which it opens up via the northern route (hence the title of the exhibition 'Northbound'), the North Sea is rich in extraordinary resources. It is also one of the world's most active regions for the marine industry, and a particularly dynamic area for leisure and tourism. The North Sea, which is subject to extreme anthropogenic pressures, is also recognised by all seafarers as a rough, unpredictable, and dangerous sea, and remains a challenging sea in many respects. The specificities of the North Sea and the near Arctic call for solutions and best practices to combine economic use of their resources with sustainable protection of their marine biodiversity.

A SEMINAR FOR A SUSTAINABLE OCEAN

Open to the general public and accessible via live streaming, the seminar benefits from the expertise of Prof. Dr. Peter Herzig, former Director General of the renowned German research institute GEOMAR Helmholtz Centre for Ocean Research in Kiel. During a whole afternoon, leading personalities will present solutions and positive impact initiatives - such as Marine Protected Areas, new aquaculture concepts or some forms of wind farms - that are being implemented to preserve the extraordinary richness of the connected ecosystems of the North Sea and the Arctic, in response to the cross-cutting challenges of climate, biodiversity and the development of a sustainable blue economy.





The discussions will highlight the role of both science and art and the power of dialogue in driving the general public, the decision makers and the private sector towards the protection of the Ocean. The discussions will go beyond borders and will provide a source of inspiration and a basis for dialogue and possible synergies between the actors of the North Sea and the Mediterranean Sea, two "laboratory seas" for the preservation of the World Ocean and two historical cultural vectors between peoples.

With this seminar, the Oceanographic Institute, the Museum Kunst der Westküste and all the participants hope to provide a source of inspiration and a basis for dialogue and possible synergies between the actors of each of these territories.

Among the high-level participants: Tinka Murk, Professor at the University of Wageningen in the Netherlands, Mojib Latif, climatologist, Professor at GEOMAR and President of the German Association of the Club of Rome, Antje Boetius, Director of the Alfred Wegener Institute, specialised in marine and polar research, Arved Fuchs, explorer, journalist, writer and filmmaker, Ulrike Wolff-Thomsen, Director of the MKdW. Boris Herrmann, Skipper of Team Malizia, who will send us a friendly message from his regatta location.

The seminar's Master of Ceremony will be Ms Leila Ghandi, award winning TV Host reporter, explorer, documentary film producer and director.
